

Dr. Khyati Yogeshkumar Joshi

Khyati Y. Joshi is an Associate Professor of Education at Fairleigh Dickinson University. Dr. Joshi is the author of the book *New Roots in America's Sacred Ground: Religion, Race, and Ethnicity in Indian America* (Rutgers University Press, 2006), which received the National Association for Multicultural Education's 2007 Philip C. Chinn Book Award. She is co-editor of *Understanding Religious Oppression and Christian Privilege* (Sense Publishers, 2008) and *Improbable Southerners: Asian Americans in the South* (University of Georgia Press, 2011). She is the author of numerous other book chapters and articles on race, immigration and religion. Dr. Joshi is a member of the United Nations Committee on the Freedom of Religion. In addition to numerous presentations to U.S. academic conferences, Professor Joshi has been invited by the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE) to Vienna, Austria, to speak on the racialization of religion, particularly Hinduism, Sikhism and Islam, as it relates to the development of policies to prevent and combat hate crimes in the OSCE region, and to deliver a plenary address at an international conference on the Indian Diaspora in Gujarat, India, sponsored by the Government of India. Professor Joshi earned her doctorate in Social Justice Education at the University of Massachusetts-Amherst. She is a graduate of Emory University and pursued post-graduate studies at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem.
